Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990)

Throughout his multi-directional career, composing was Bernstein's musical lifeblood. It is well noted that he is one of the few "serious" composers who has been equally successful in popular music-theatre. He is also well known as a conductor and teacher. In 1958, at the age of 39, he took on the post of principal conductor of the New York Philharmonic. Throughout his career he conducted most major symphonic orchestras of the world making many recordings and television appearances. He was also a respected teacher and lecturer of music. His influences in all aspects of music have assured him the distinction of being considered one of the greatest contributors of the 20th Century. It is with honor and respect that we present this musical tribute to this great genius that much of the world knows as "Lenny."

Overture to Candide

In 1955 Leonard Bernstein was working on a musical version of Voltaire's *Candide* with the distinguished American playwright Lillian Hellman. This Overture, which sets the tone of the musical to follow, has become one of the most performed works of Mr. Bernstein. It appears regularly on the programs of orchestras and is known for its virtuosic instrumental flourishes and exciting rhythm. It is a challenge for any instrumental ensemble.

French Choruses from The Lark

Also in 1955, while working on *Candide*, Bernstein wrote these choruses as incidental music for the play *The Lark* adapted by Miss Hellman from the original French version by Jean Anouilh. Since the drama is about the trial of Joan of Arc, Mr. Bernstein's music is deliberately evocative of that great Saint's medieval era. These choruses, as in the *Chichester Psalms*, use a male alto soloist. The first performance of these pieces was in New York on November 17, 1955 at the Longacre Theatre.

Chichester Psalms

This piece was commissioned by the Dean of the Cathedral of Chichester in Sussex, England, for the annual summer music festival held by Winchester, Salisbury and Chichester Cathedrals. It was performed at Chichester on July 31, 1965, but the premiere had come sixteen days earlier at a concert of the New York Philharmonic conducted by Mr. Bernstein. The text for the work is compiled from various selections of the Psalms, including the favorite Psalm 23, which is given to the male alto soloist and choral treble voices. The text however is performed in Hebrew. The music also has Hebrew roots. Modal melodies and harsh utterances, aided by odd meters and at times obsessive repetition, create an aura of ancient ritual. However, the piece still has its basis in tonality. The Chorale-like coda proceeds from dissonance to consonance, blending Hebrew words with Christian choral sound in praise of brotherhood and unity (words partially from program notes by Nick Jones.)

In this performance we are using a combination of the full score for orchestra and the reduced version scored for Organ, Harp and Percussion. The addition of the string parts helps to restore the composer's original intention especially in the Prelude to Part III.

"Make Our Garden Grow" from Candide

This stirring chorale finale from the musical uses the translated words of Voltaire to show the resolution of the relationships within the drama. It is an inspiring text and musical finale.
